

### ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS AT HUXLOW ACADEMY



Our expectation is that our students don't fall below 97%
This is equivalent to no more than 6 days off in an academic year

Research shows that students with attendance above 96% achieve, on average, one grade higher at GCSE than their peers.

There is still time to improve attendance and results! Lets do it together!



### Mock and Exam Expectations

- Check seating plans/timetables and be on time
- Inform Huxlow Academy if you are going to be late or miss an exam due to illness or other acceptable reason
- Visit the toilet before you arrive
- Come prepared black pen/equipment
- Wear correct uniform
- Silence as soon as enter exam room
- Mobile phones turned OFF and left in bag outside exam room
- Listen to instructions
- Put your hand up if you need the invigilator DO NOT SHOUT OUT

**Exam/Mock Exam Rules and Expectations** 

### Al

- Eg. ChatGPT/Snapchat My Al
- Write, make art create music
- Al misuse is when you take something made using Al and say it's your own work.



- Not allowed in any exam
- Teachers will tell you if it is allowed for coursework (dependant on qualification)
- Even if you're allowed to use AI tools, you can't get marks for content just produced by AI – your marks come from showing your own understanding and producing your own work
- Referencing and plagarism
- Signed declaration of own work
- AI misuse could lose your marks for the assessment you could even be disqualified from the subject.



### Our use of data Mr Johnson

#### The Purpose and Power of Mock Examinations

#### What Mock Data Reveals

Mock examinations allow us to measure how effectively curriculum knowledge has been **learnt**, **retained and applied** under authentic exam conditions. They provide essential insights into student readiness and understanding.

Through careful analysis, we can identify specific **strengths and misconceptions** within topics, question types, and critical skills such as analysis, evaluation, and extended writing. This granular view helps teachers understand exactly where students need additional support.

#### **Benchmarking Progress**

Mock data enables us to benchmark students' **current attainment** against both target grades and national standards, providing a clear picture of trajectory towards final outcomes.

However, reliable mock data is only valuable when assessment conditions are consistent, marking is standardised and moderated across subjects, and entry codes with grade boundaries are applied correctly. Accurate data leads to credible analysis, which drives meaningful intervention.

#### From Data to Action – Making Mock Results Count



#### Track Attainment

Identify whether students are on track, above, or below their FFT or internal target grades, enabling precise monitoring of cohort performance.



#### **Analyse Progress**

Compare current performance to prior attainment including KS2 data, previous mocks, and ongoing class assessments to measure value-added progress.



#### **Spot Patterns**

Examine performance differences across boys vs girls, SEND, PP, PLV students, attendance impact, and subject-specific gaps to identify equity issues.



#### Inform Interventions

Design targeted support including tutoring programmes, reteach plans, small-group work, or timetable adjustments based on specific needs identified in the data.

Mock data is not the end — it's the diagnostic tool that tells us what to reteach, who to support, and how to raise outcomes. The more accurate the data, the sharper the intervention, and the greater the progress we can achieve for every student.

## Access Arrangements and how they are applied

- It's about all students being on a level playing field with equal opportunity to access their assessments and exams
- JCQ expectations changes for this year
- Extra Time v Supervised Rest Breaks
- Evidence of Normal Way of Working
- Normal Way of Working what does this mean
- Mocks are an opportunity to trial these arrangements and only after the mocks will we be able to apply officially to the JCQ for these arrangements
- If a student does not use the suggested arrangement, meaning we have no evidence, then we will not be able to apply for that arrangement
